As we turn our attention and efforts to the potential challenges that come with the return of warm weather, we are extremely pleased and proud to share with you that 2014 is the 70th Anniversary of the Gladwyne Fire Company.

Little did anyone know back in the spring of 1944 when, at a town meeting to discuss the need for adequate fire protection within the Gladwyne community, your fire company would have grown to become one of the premier fire companies in Pennsylvania.

In September of 1944 a committee of residents was formed to

pursue the creation of a fire company in Gladwyne. A building and equipment campaign was begun with the goal of purchasing a fire engine and provide adequate housing. By March of 1946, \$10,000 had been raised, a sum sufficient for the Lower Merion Board of Commissioners to recognize the Gladwyne Fire Company as the operating fire company in Gladwyne.

Of course none of this would have been possible without the commitment of a select group of residents who subsequently volunteered to be members of the Gladwyne fire-fighter brigade and the generous financial support of the Gladwyne community.

For 70 years your fire company has fulfilled its commitment to safely protect the lives of you, your family, and your property. You can rest assured that will continue to be our goal in the years that lie ahead.

On behalf of our volunteer fire-fighters, our three career housemen, and our Board, we look forward to celebrating our 70th Anniversary year with the entire Gladwyne community.

## 2013 - A Year in Review!

First, a special ‘thank you’ to all of the Volunteers, Career Staff Members, Board of Directors and community members for all of the support and help that you have provided to our company throughout the year.

As many of you are aware, it was a challenging year. Your Gladwyne Firefighters answered the 319 emergency calls for help with the utmost professionalism and returned home safely to their families after each and every call. Above and beyond answering the many calls, our firefighters met every Wednesday night and spent countless hours training and practicing our craft of protecting the lives and property in our community.

Due to the extreme weather, the first two months of 2014 have proven to be busier than ever. Our volunteers have already answered 65 emergency calls for help! They have spent many hours away from their homes and many have staffed the firehouse to ensure quick response. Early the morning of February 5th, the Gladwyne Firefighters responded to a call for a significant fire at a house on Youngsford Rd. which was extinguished quickly and efficiently.

On February 11, 2014 we received word from the PA State Fire Commissioner and the PA State EMS Director that we were being recognized as the 1st Pennsylvania State Swift-Water Rescue Type 2A Team in Montgomery County. This cherished award certification affirms that we are equipped and trained to the standards set forth by several accrediting agencies.

On behalf of everyone at the Gladwyne Fire Company, I would like thank the residents of our community for all their wonderful support in 2013 and wish you a healthy and safe 2014.

## CFL Bulb Safety



Energy saving Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs are becoming very common in homes and at work. In addition to using less electricity, they also have a positive impact on the global climate. Here are important safety tips regarding CFL's.

### When a CFL Burns Out

- It may smoke and the plastic base may blacken. This is normal and not a fire safety issue.
- CFL's should never be discarded with household trash, but instead recycled.

### If a CFL Breaks

CFLs are made of glass and can break. Care should be taken when removing from a socket, from packaging and installing. If a CFL breaks:

- OPEN a window and allow the room to air out for 5–10 minutes.
- People and pets should LEAVE the room.
- TURN OFF forced air heating and/or air conditioning.
- COLLECT broken glass and visible powder using stiff cardboard, tape or a damp paper towel.
- PLACE the debris in a glass container with a metal cover in a safe location outside until you can dispose of it.
- CONTACT your local government to find out how to dispose of the debris.
- CONTINUE airing out the room for several hours.

## A Winter to Remember....

It's been a busy few months, as Gladwyne Firefighters responded to multiple fires and emergencies in the area. We even found time to train for ice rescues on Dove Lake.

Despite the cold weather and falling snow, Gladwyne Firefighters spent 3 hours training in ice rescue at a local pond that the homeowner was gracious enough to allow us to use.

Several holes were cut into the ice and we started practicing self-rescue drills, rescuing both conscious and unconscious victims, and utilizing our "banana boat" or Oceanid Rapid Deployment Craft to assist in ice rescues.



Gladwyne Firefighters responded to a house fire on Youngsford Road in the early morning hours during a snow/ice storm. The fire was contained and later found to have been started by a surge protector that sparked when the electricity went out and lit a nearby sofa.
